

Type 2 – phrasal verbs with an object separable (some phrasal verbs have an object and can be separated – we can put the object before or after the particle)

I *looked* the word *up* in the dictionary

I looked up the word in the dictionary

Type 3 – phrasal verbs with an object - inseparable. (some phrasal verbs have an object but can't be separated – the verb and the particle must stay together, even if the object is a pronoun) My husband looks after the children Where is your book? I don't know I'm looking for it He doesn't get on with his parents

Some common phrasal verbs

Type 3 ask for, fall out with, get away from.


